SCRIPTURE READING:

Exodus 25:8-9

'Have the people build Me a holy sanctuary so I can live among them. You must build this Tabernacle and its furnishings exactly according to the pattern I will show you.' (NLT)

GOD HAS A PLAN AND A PURPOSE FOR YOU

In this story we see how God had a plan to build a tabernacle, or a sanctuary. The purpose was so that He could have a place where He could meet with His people and live with them. It's always been God's plan to engage with us and for us to know and experience His presence. But the people had a role to play in this plan – they had to build this place of meeting. They had to bring what they had and put it towards making the plan a possibility.

Exodus 25:8 'Have the people build Me a holy sanctuary...'

Part of God's plan and purpose for your life is for you to make space for Him in your life. It is something you have to actively work on and deliberately pursue. He wants you to actively pursue Him so that you can experience Him for yourself. The truth is that God wants to be with you. He wants to make His dwelling (live among) with you.

Exodus 25:8 '...so I can live among them.'

God has a plan to use your life and to involve you in the process.

Psalm 90:1

'Lord, You have been our dwelling place throughout all generations.'

WENEED TO GET BUSY MAKING ROOM FOR GOD

In this story the people were on a journey and that journey took them through a wilderness. In this wilderness they had frustrations and spent much of their time going round and round the same mountain. Now the time had come for them to make a priority out of making space for God in their lives. The Lord instructed them to make this space where He could meet with them. In each of our lives we need to make space for more of God in our lives. We tend to get so busy and distracted that we don't end up spending time with God or focusing on the Lord. We need to restructure our lives so that we make room for Him in our lives, and He can become the priority He should be. Even if our journey is long and frustrating and we find ourselves wandering in the wilderness of life, we can redeem the time by making time for God. Let us make those quality decisions and set aside time and effort to make room for God in our lives.



GOD PROVIDES FOR WHAT HE HAS ASKED US TO DO

When God told them to build the sanctuary, He told everyone to bring what they had available. They brought what they had, and it was exactly what was needed to build the Tabernacle. God provided them with what they needed so that they could do what was requested in order to experience Him and His presence in their lives. God provides for what He wants to do and for what He wants to see happen. If they had decided that they wanted to do more or include more than what He had requested, they would have had to find it themselves. This is often where we make our mistake. Work with what God has given you, use the time you have and follow the passion He has placed in your heart for Him. Don't get fancy and don't get distracted by waiting for perfect conditions before you pursue Him. Take what you have, give Him your heart and He will work with what you have offered and begin to make Himself a living reality to you.

DO EXACTLY AS HE SHOWS YOU TO AVOID ANXIETY

Following God involves doing what He tells us to do and obeying His instructions.

Exodus 25:9

'You must build this Tabernacle and its furnishings exactly according to the pattern I will show you.'

Often when we follow our own ideas or do what seems good to us, we take on burdens and responsibilities that God did not intend for us to carry. When we think we can do it (life) on our own or on our own terms we bring anxiety into our lives. When we insist on doing it our way, we have to carry something that we were never meant to carry. Sometimes we take on so many unnecessary things that the load becomes too much to carry. How much better things could be if we just did what He told us to do and learnt to be content with God's pattern and program. He wants to meet with you and show you which way to go.

Exodus 25:22
'I will meet with you and give you all My commands...'

IN THE PROCESS GOD WANTS TO WORK IN OUR LIVES

Your life is important to God. He loves you just the way you are but loves you too much to leave you just the way you are. He wants each one of us to learn from Him and in the process our very natures can be changed, and we can become more like Him.

Romans 8:28

'And we know that God causes everything to work together for the good of those who love God and are called according to His purpose for them.'


This is one of the greatest joys we can know in life, the joy of knowing that we are called for His purposes and plans. In my years of being in the ministry, I have discovered that I am at my happiest and at my most fulfilled when I am doing what God destined, called and purposed for me to do. When I take a detour along the road of my own making, I find myself to be anxious and troubled. This is because I need to get back to the main thing and that is loving and serving God and seeking His presence in my life daily. At the end of the day God is particularly concerned about us as individuals and He wants to see His nature reflected in our character because of our interaction and relationship with Him.

ASK HIM TO LEAD YOU DAY BY DAY

A life lived to His glory and honour is a life that is determined to pursue Him and to do what He says we should do. Our hearts should be open and yield to His leading in our lives. Often He will lead us step by step and day by day. We may not always see the big picture, but as we do what honours Him in each small decision of the day, we will find we have made progress on the path He has for us. Let us stay connected to God. Let us do what He shows us to do. Let us not do anything that we know He would not have us do. Let us follow His example and let us be changed to look more like Him, do more of what He would do and live a life that pleases Him. Then our lives will become a living tabernacle, a living sanctuary where we can experience and enjoy His presence. And in that place we will find His presence and experience His glory like we have not known it before.

2 Corinthians 3:18
'So all of us who have had that veil removed can see and reflect the glory of the Lord. And the Lord – Who is the Spirit – makes us more and more like Him as we are changed into His glorious image.'

Ask Him to lead you day by day and step by step and live life to His glory and honour.



In 2 Corinthians, the apostle Paul emphasizes the importance of restoring relationships with other believers and preserving unity in the church. Therefore, it is fitting that he concludes his letter with this final benediction: "The grace of the Lord Jesus Christ, and the love of God, and the communion of the Holy Spirit be with you all" (2 Corinthians 13:11–14, NKJV).

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
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
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Paul makes a similar appeal to the Philippians, reminding them that our union with Christ calls us to live together humbly as one body joined in the communion of the Holy Spirit: "Is there any encouragement from belonging to Christ? Any comfort from his love? Any fellowship together in the Spirit? Are your hearts tender and compassionate? Then make me truly happy by agreeing wholeheartedly with each other, loving one another, and working together with one mind and purpose" (Philippians 2:1-2, NLT).

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


In 1 John 5:1-12, the apostle John discusses the victory of the Christian faith. Genuine Christians believe Jesus Christ is the incarnate Son of God and Saviour of the world, and they demonstrate that faith through loving God the Father and obeying His commands. Such faith holds a special reward, which is victory over the world: "For whatever is born of God overcomes the world. And this is the victory that has overcome the world—our faith" (verse 4, NKJV).

Being "born of God" literally means "to be fathered of God." Redeemed, "born of God" believers have the divine nature within them through the indwelling Holy Spirit (John 3:5-8). Those who put their faith in Jesus Christ "become children of God-children born not of natural descent, nor of human decision or a husband's will, but born of God" (John 1:12-13)

The verb translated as "overcomes" in 1 John 5:4 is a favourite of John's (see 1 John 2:13–14; Revelation 2:7, 11, 17, 26; 3:5, 12, 21). It refers to winning a victory over something or someone, as in a contest or military conflict. Christians are overcomers not because of any particular virtue of their own but because they are born of God, having the Spirit of Christ living inside them. This indwelling spiritual source is greater than any power in this world (1 John 4:4).

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Nevertheless, in Ephesians 6:11-17, the apostle Paul teaches believers that they must continue to overcome the world through prayer and spiritual warfare, staying alert and on guard against surprise attacks from the devil: "Put on the full armor of God, so that you can take your stand against the devil's schemes" (verse 11; see also 1 Peter 5:8-9).

Overcoming "the world" also refers to the believer's victory over sin: "No one who is born of God will continue to sin, because God's seed remains in them; they cannot go on sinning, because they have been born of God" (1 John 3:9; see also 1 John 5:18; Romans 6:11-14; 7:24-25). John isn't saying we will never sin again as Christians (see 1 John 1:8, 10). Instead, he is encouraging a lifestyle of careful, consistent resistance to sin (Acts 20:28; 1 Corinthians 15:34; 1 Peter 2:11; Hebrews 3:13; James 1:21) so that, when we fall short, we humbly confess our sins and receive His cleansing forgiveness (1 John 1:9). When we fail, we don't give up. When we fall, we stand back up, firm in our confession of faith until the end (1 Corinthians 16:13; Galatians 5:1; 1 Thessalonians 3:8). When we are tempted, we resist the devil (James 4:7; Romans 6:13; Ephesians 4:26-27) and look for the way of escape that God always provides (1 Corinthians 10:13; Hebrews 2:18; 4:15-16). Every day, we depend on God alone for strength, grace, direction, purpose, and wisdom to live for Him and follow His plan (Proverbs 3:5-6; 2 Corinthians 12:9; Titus 2:11-13; 2 Peter 1:3-4).

We who are born of God overcome this world as we endure afflictions, troubles, trials, suffering, and heartache (John 16:33; James 1:12; Romans 8:35-39). Through it all, the ever-present love of Christ sustains us, and "despite all these things, overwhelming victory is ours through Christ, who loved us" (Romans 8:37, NLT). Ultimately, we receive the victor's crown of eternal life (1 Corinthians 9:25; James 1:12; 2 Timothy 4:7-8; 1 Peter 5:4; Revelation 2:7, 10, 4:4, 10).

WHAT DOES IT MEAN TO

RUN

SET BEFORE US [HEBREWS 12:1]?

"Since we are surrounded by such a great cloud of witnesses, let us throw off everything that hinders and the sin that so easily entangles. And let us run with perseverance the race marked out for us" (Hebrews 12:1). What kind of race do believers run? Who sets the race parameters? Is it a race we define and purpose for ourselves? The passage in question draws from the rich imagery of the footraces of ancient Israel, Greece, and the amphitheaters of Rome. It was written to encourage and challenge believers to persevere in their faith, especially in the midst of trials and persecution (2 Timothy 2:15; Hebrews 10:36; 12:7).

Athletes in a race were surrounded by rows and rows of spectators, pictured for us as "a great cloud of witnesses." The "witnesses" of the believers' race are listed in the previous chapter of Hebrews: the men and women of God whose faithful lives were recorded in the Old Testament. These saints persevered despite unimaginable oppression and cruelty (Hebrews 11:33–38) and were commended for their faithfulness. Whether the saints of Hebrews 11 are actually watching us run our "race" today is doubtful; the point of the passage is that their testimony lives on. Their unyielding faith bears witness to the promises of Jesus Christ, urging us to follow their example and "run with perseverance the race marked out for us" (Hebrews 12:1).

The "race," then, is the Christian life. It's a marathon, not a sprint, and we are called to stay the course and remain faithful to the end. Paul used this same imagery near the end of his life: "I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race, I have kept the faith" (2 Timothy 4:7).





The steadfastness of the Old Testament "witnesses" speaks to believers today of the rewards of staying in the race, of never giving up (1 Corinthians 9:24; Philippians 3:14). A marathon is a strenuous test of fitness and endurance. The race set before us requires faith, stamina, commitment, and discipline in order to live faithfully (1 Corinthians 9:25–26; Philippians 3:12–14; 1 Timothy 6:12).

The race is "set before us"; we did not select the course, for it is God who established it. This race we run for Christ. We stay the course in spite of trials and persecutions (Hebrews 12:4–11). As we run, we must "fix our eyes on Jesus, the author and perfecter of our faith" (Hebrews 12:2). Because He perfectly finished His race, He is the focus of our lives. We look away from all distractions because He is already at the finish line (Lamentations 3:25; Matthew 6:33; Romans 2:7).

The race demands that we do away with "everything that hinders"—sin and whatever else threatens our relationship with God (Hebrews 12:1). Anything that will slow us down or trip up us must be cast off. The apostle Paul says "to put off your old self, which is being corrupted by its deceitful desires; to be made new in the attitude of your minds; and to put on the new self, created to be like God in true righteousness and holiness" (Ephesians 4:22–24). With the encouragement of those who have gone on before, we rid ourselves of thoughts, attitudes, and habits that impede our progress (Romans 12:2; Titus 3:3; 1 Peter 1:14).

Seeing that the race God set out for us is a lifelong marathon, we must commit ourselves to run to the very end. A daily regimen of prayer, worship, reading God's Word and examining our lives for impediments will help. We will persevere by maintaining a Christlike attitude even in the midst of trials (1 Peter 2:21; 4:1; 1 John 2:6).

RUN

No matter how long the race may be, we keep our eyes on Jesus, "the champion who initiates and perfects our faith" (Hebrews 12:2, NLT). There is joy awaiting. In the words of songwriters Twila and Starla Paris, "Runner, when the race is won, you will run into His arms."

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
